FIXINS'

Storage time will soon be here and many hours will be spent getting ready for next season. During the upcoming editions I will attempt to discuss many of the little things that can be done to ensure a long season of efficient running next year.

A trouble free summer is almost impossible, but a great number of items can be done between now and next spring. E.g., a simple method of lowering the running temperature can be had by:

- If your pass light is mounted in the centre of the grill, move it to one side. This allows free passage of air into the grill and rad.
- 2. If your license plate is mounted on the grill or in the central area on the bumper, remove it and place it on either side.


These two items will make for an approximately 15 degree decrease in temperature. You will be surprised to know that the removal of the license plate from in front of the grill increases air flow to the radiator by 20%.

Many people have made use of a scoop and blocking system. This helps, but do not get carried away! The cooling system is designed to allow a certain amount of air passage under and around the radiator to cool the block and headers. By blocking these flow passages, especially the vertical ones, the effeciency and effect of air scoops is reduced as the engine block and exhaust headers do not get the cooling provided by the air that would normally by-pass the radiator.

There will be more to come on scoops and cooling systems in the next edition.
